Times are tough, we know. The financial situation nationwide has been unstable for several years. All of us have been cautious about how we spend and donate our money.

Mail boxes get stuffed with pleas and holiday incentive gifts (address labels, calendars, wrapping paper, cards, note pads, etc.) from charities of all kinds seeking donations of all amounts. You wonder where they received your name and where the money really goes. Some charities repeat their pleas week after week.

But here at Prospect Hill the formula is different. We give no incentive holiday gifts and know exactly how and where our donations are spent.

As we have mentioned many times before, all contributions to our Year-End Holiday Memorial Fundraising Campaign go entirely toward the upkeep, expenses and beautification of our historic cemetery and the old stone house residence of Superintendent Joe Connell.

So we are appealing to you on a more personal basis. Let's not forget our own departed loved ones during this joyous holiday season when memories of happier days gone by keep filling our hearts and minds. Your donation to Prospect Hill is actually like a personal holiday present to your departed loved one.

Contributions have fallen in recent years partly because the list of faithful contributors continues to shrink. We continue to operate under financial pressure. Let's not let that continue!

### OTHER WAYS TO HONOR YOUR LOVED ONES

Another opportunity for you to honor your deceased loved ones and contribute to the upkeep of the cemetery is to transfer appreciated securities (stocks, bonds, etc.). You'll receive a federal tax deduction for the value of the security, and not have to pay a capital gains tax calculated on the original value of the security.

You might want to depart with a security(s) you feel is not producing the way you would like. Prospect Hill welcomes such "non-producers" with hopes they will turn around in the future, or may convert them to cash tax free.

Any number of shares may be transferred to our brokerage account and would be a most appreciated End-of-Year holiday gift to the cemetery.

Still another way you can help ensure the future of our cemetery is to include it in your will (called a bequest). We have received several such bequests in the past and would welcome any in the future. It is best that a bequest is "unrestricted" so the cemetery can use the funds to fulfill any of its needs.

Consult your attorney for more information on how you can transfer your securities or honor our cemetery with a bequest. Your Board of Trustees appreciates any such contributions that will help secure the future of our historic Prospect Hill Cemetery.

### YOU CAN ALSO HONOR THEM ON OUR LARGE CHRISTMAS WREATH

Want to help beautify your cemetery in a different way this holiday season? Once again your Board of Trustees will place a large wreath on the porch of the gatehouse for you to decorate with special Christmas cards honoring your loved ones.

For an extra donation to the cemetery you may purchase one (or more) of these special cards that will give the names of those you wish to honor and also the name of the donor. This card (or cards) will be attached to the wreath which will remain on the porch door until after the first of the year.

Rain, sleet, snow all took their toll on individual wreaths offered in the past by your cemetery to buy and place on designated graves. The present wreath-on-porch idea has worked out well. Drop by the cemetery during Christmas week and see the Christmas wreath decorated with your cards.

# TWO GENEROUS LOT OWNERS AGREE TO PAY FOR A NEW FLAG POLE AND FLAG

On your next visit to Prospect Hill Cemetery you may be "greeted" at the entrance by a new flag pole and American flag.

Paint has been chipping off the old pole for sometime and it has become rusty in spots. The flag was getting frayed and faded.

When hearing of this, two anonymous lot owners stepped forward and agreed to pay the entire cost of both pole and flag, removal of the old pole and installation of the new – a most generous contribution to the ongoing beautification of our historic cemetery.

The cost of the pole, flag, demolition and installation is approximately \$2000. The package includes all fittings, nylon internal rope and steel ground sleeve. The aluminum pole will be 25 feet tall. The flag will be 5-feet X 8-feet and will cost approximately \$50.

# PROSPECT HILL'S NEIGHBORHOOD WAS FEATURED IN THE WASHINGTON POST'S REAL ESTATE COLUMN, "WHERE WE LIVE"

Earlier this year, The Washington Post in its weekly Saturday Real Estate column, "Where We Live," featured the small community of Stronghold in which Prospect Hill Cemetery is a part of. Quotes from the writer were most enlightening.

- -----"turning the seven square-block area (containing only six streets) into one of those places where everyone knows everyone else and neighbors genuinely take care of one another."
- -----"Think of it as an island of calm off North Capitol's (street) busy axis. The streets are lined with Federal style row houses build around 1920, with ample yards and porches that get a good workout in the warm months.
- -----"The Stronghold Civic Association is vibrant, meeting monthly to organize neighborhood cleanup days and an annual reunion for area residents."

Tiny Stronghold's boundaries are North Capitol Street to the west, Michigan Avenue to the north, Glenwood Cemetery to the east and Prospect Hill Cemetery to the south.

# FIERCE SUMMER WEATHER CAUSES MUCH DAMAGE AT PROSPECT HILL ROADS WERE BLOCKED, ANGEL STATUE TUMBLED DURING STORM

The extreme heat and destructive storms in July and August kept Superintendent Connell on the alert all summer long.


During one short and ferocious storm, large branches were ripped from trees and blocked the roadways at six different points (see the drawing below). One large branch, measuring about 25 feet long, fell on the angel statue "guarding" the new Memorial Grove and broke off one of its wings. One other headstone was knocked over.

"You would not believe the damage done to the cemetery in about 20 minutes," said Connell. The debris was too much for Connell to clear away by himself so he called the always reliable R & R Tree Service of Silver Spring, MD. They arrived early the next day.

Connell also made several trips to Virginia Outdoor Power Co. of Fairfax to repair our chainsaw with a new chain and fuel filter, get a new blade installed on one mower and purchase a trimmer cord and fuel mix.

Besides trimming around headstones with a weed eater, Connell also cut down sucker trees and bushes around them with large hedge clippers and an ax. He also trimmed and cleaned trash from tree boxes on the North Capitol Street sidewalk.

Other summer duties performed by Connell are too numerous to mention. What would the cemetery do without our super superintendent?



### A LETTER OF INTEREST


